## STOP THE ROBBERY OF TRELAND'S MINERAL WEALTH !!

IRELAND NOW HAS: -

The largest known zinc-lead find in the world at Navan; The largest underground zinc mine in Europe at Silvermines; The largest producing lead mine in Europe at Tynagh; Large mercury, magnesite, barytes and silver deposits at Gortdrum, Bennettsbridge and Ballynoe; Considerable wealth in oil and gas on the Continental Shelf;

THE CONSTITUTION STATES:- "all mines, minerals and waters belong to the State" (Article IO). This position is ratified and enforced by the Land Acts and the 1940 Minerals Act.

BUT, successive Governments have denationalised our minerals by giving our property away to international mining companies through State Mining Leases. The people have received minimal benefits from this and Irish minerals have been exported free of tax, and almost free of royalties, as raw **eres** to be processed and manufactured abroad. The new taxation policy does not alter the situation; the State still intends to give <u>our mines</u> away to the mining companies and it shortly is going to give <u>Navan</u>, the largest known zinc/lead find in the world, away to Tara Mines Ltd. Taxation yielding £130 million over twenty years will only secure for the Irish people 6% of the gross metal value of the Navan ores and present policy will mean that the country will also lose the massive potential for industrial development provided by the ores. <u>AND</u>, Government policy on Navan could well set a precedent for future discoveries on land and offshore. WE MUST STOP THIS SELL-OUT OF OUR WEALTH !

The RESOURCES PROTECTION CAMPAIGN is a broadly based, national organisation which has been founded to ensure that the people of Ireland get the maximum benefit from this country's considerable natural resources.

THE R.P.C. DEMANDS :-

- \* That the Government should retain its ownership of Irish minerals and not relinquish them by granting a State Mining Lease to any private company
- \* That all Government negotiations with Tara Mines Ltd should cease immediately in respect of a State Mining Lease for Navan
- \* That the Government should grant the lease for Navan exclusively to the State-owned Mianrai Teoranta
- \* That a State-owned smelter be established simultaneously with the development of Mianrai Teo.'s operations
- \* That manufacturing industries be established to use the metals from an Irish smelter to create employment in this country from our own natural wealth
